Christ is Risen!

For this month's edition of the AGAPE I wanted to share with you an interview that was done by C.O.M.E. Assistant Director Thomaida Hudanish with Charles Leontis of St John the Baptist Orthodox Church of Monterey Co. I had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Leontis at the Metropolis Clergy Laity Assembly and I was inspired by his person and his story. While I don't know his exact age I believe he is close to 80-years old. This is a good example of the work of C.O.M.E. and why its important for us to support Mochas for Missions.

For several years the parishioners of St. John the Baptist in Salinas, California were without a full-time priest. Their membership had dwindled and their church location was no longer satisfactory. They approached the Metropolis for guidance, which resulted in a visit from C.O.M.E. Director, Fr. Theodore Dorrance, and regular mentoring visits from Fr. Aris Metrakos of Holy Trinity in San Francisco. In a short time, parishioners created a 5-year plan, doubled their Stewardship, developed their parish life, and set their focus on reaching out to both former members and the non-Orthodox. In July 2015, Fr. Ion Coman was assigned full-time and in December of the same year, the parish moved to Carmel. Long-time parishioner and Parish Council President Charles Leontis spoke with C.O.M.E. about the process.

Mr. Leontis, in a matter of a few months the parish doubled its stewardship. Can you tell us how you did it? When Fr. Theodore came to visit us, he told us that we needed to double our stewardship before proceeding further, so we made that our priority. First, all the Parish Council members made the commitment. Then, I went around to each parishioner's home or place of business, told them what the Parish Council did and asked them to join us. Because there are so few of us in the parish, I was able to make all the visits myself. Some people struggled with it, but they really responded to the need. Of course, it's not ideal to ask for people to give just to meet a need. It's much better to cultivate a spirit of sacrificial giving. But this worked in our emergency.

What other changes helped your community? One significant change is that we're using mostly English in our services now. I was born and raised in Greece and I learned to chant the hymns in Greek, so I struggle to do them in English, but I'm trying. Although I believed otherwise for a long time, I've come around to the idea that you should do the services in the language of the people. The older people in our parish got used to it and now anybody new that comes in knows what's going on. Doing the Liturgy in English has really helped a lot, in my opinion. That and small groups. Small groups were probably one of the most impactful of all the things that we've done. How did that work? What topics were discussed? Fr. Aris brought various questions for discussion. One that comes to mind is, "Are you a Martha or a Mary?" We were all together in one room in 3-4 groups of 6-7 people each. We discussed the topic for a while and then reported back to the group at large. The biggest benefit was that we really got to know one another. It allowed people to express themselves who wouldn't have felt comfortable talking in front of 50 people. Everyone who participated was really pleased. By the way, we had some new members join the parish as a result of the small groups. We advertised in the community and people came-also people came from other Orthodox parishes in the Bay Area.

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What does your 5-year plan look like now? We need to continue to grow our stewardship. And we need to find ways to expose the community to our parish. What has been the most noticeable change in parish *since the assignment of a priest?* The first noticeable thing is that people pay greater attention in church. There's a sense of awe-you feel that you're in church, because Fr. Ion gives that example. The services are very reverent. He's very devoted and sincere. *Please tell us more about the parish's new location.* In mid-December we began worshipping at All Saints Church in Carmel. The congregation uses their hall only rarely, so they've allowed us to rent it; we have access for both weekend and weekday services. There is also a library for meetings and space for an office, Sunday School and storage. All Saints has been very friendly and welcoming. They even presented a cake to us on our first Sunday. We invited them to our feast day and twenty of them came to Vespers. They were really pleased with Met. Nikitas' homily. It's a nice facility and it's really what we need right now, because we want to concentrate on outreach. There are two other Orthodox churches nearby, but there's no other church that is offering Orthodoxy to Americans [i.e. services in English] and we hope to be able to do that.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As we enter the month of May, the operations account is at \$11,160. By comparison, the operations account at the beginning of April was at \$16,029. An Orthodox Christian Steward is an active participant in the life of the Church. The parish encourages all who accept the Orthodox Faith to become practicing Stewards. Each year the Steward is expected to carefully review his or her personal circumstances and make a commitment of time, talent, and treasure to support the Parish and her Ministries, which in turn support the National Ministries of our Archdiocese, Metropolises, and institutions.

A successful Orthodox Christian Stewardship Program should provide for the entire Parish Ministries and Operating Budget as well as the growth of those ministries. Stewardship revenues should completely support and provide total coverage and even allow for growth of the budget. A good word from the Fathers....

Here is what St. Hesychios the priest says about the five types of watchfulness:

1. Closely scrutinize every mental image or provocation; for only by means of a mental image can Satan fabricate an evil thought and insinuate this into the intellect in order to lead astray

- 2. Watchfulness consists in freeing the heart from all thoughts, keeping it profoundly silent and still and in praying.
- 3. Continually and humbly calling upon the Lord Jesus Christ for help (ie. the Jesus Prayer)

4. Always have the thought of death in one's mind.

5. Fix your gaze on heaven and pay no attention to anything material.
