





ST. GEORGE GREEK ORTHODOX CHURCH AUGUST 2016

Beloved in the Lord,

I had the great blessing in July of attending the Biennial National Clergy Laity Congress in Nashville, TN, and representing the parish as a delegate. The theme of this year's Congress was, "You are the Voice of Christ in a Changing World" and as always, Archbishop and Geron of America, Demetrios, gave an inspiring and instructive keynote address. He began by reminding us that if we are to be the voice of Christ in a changing world we must first and foremost know Christ. The Archbishop quoted from St Paul's letter to the Philippians where St Paul offers us guidance related to the absolute importance of knowing Christ. St Paul writes: I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ (Phil 3:8). And he adds that the purpose of his life is to know Christ and the power of His resurrection, and to share in Christ's sufferings (Phil 3:9). From his words we can see that it is essential to know Christ in order to be His voice. We must seek Him above anything else. He is the source of our life and hope.

If we know Christ, if we are constantly growing in His grace and knowledge, then as His voice we can offer hope, truth, grace and healing power to the world. Christ's voice engendered hope and it is our calling to spread that same hope to the hopeless environments in our changing world. Christ's voice, His words, offer divine wisdom and reveal the truth of God. Our voice and our words must also reveal the truth of God and offer divine wisdom. Many people today are victims of error or misguided by false ideologies. Our voice must illuminate truth and reveal the Gospel of Christ, remembering always that Christ did so in a graceful way. Christ's voice is also a voice of healing power. His voice can speak through us in a caring way in the face of adversity, persecution, and secularization, offering a witness of hope, truth, grace and healing power. Our world, it "is a changing", and the voice of Christ is needed in addressing these changes. And lest we feel overwhelmed, let us affirm that our changing world is also a world of opportunity. There is great need in the world but by God's grace, we can offer comfort, healing, restoration, stability and purpose.

Listening to the Archbishop's words I thought about how we are offering the voice of Christ here in Eugene, Oregon, I think that we offer His voice through worship and ministry in the parish. Through worship, the parish becomes the Body of Christ and listens to His voice. In words and actions the voice of Christ is spoken, heard, and experienced in our worship and little by little the parish becomes a home, a place of healing, a place of comfort, renewal and hope. We also offer the voice of Christ through the ministries of the church, especially through our Missions and Evangelism ministry. There are many people who have never heard the voice of Christ, others who are distracted by disparate and deceptive ideas, and still others who need a new invitation to return to Him. We must continue to strengthen our Missions and Evangelism ministry and fulfill our commission from God. We must continue to cultivate in each other a sense of urgency when it comes to the millions of people lost and confused in a changing world. We must also grow in our knowledge of and connection with God and His saving teachings, especially when faced with the tremendous challenges of a changing world. If you read the Gospels carefully you will not find any occasion in which the words of Christ were uttered and had not produced immediate results, be it healings, exorcisms, or extraordinary changes. You will also read that Christ promised His disciples that they would do even greater works than He did (John 14:12). As His disciples we are the recipients of this amazing promise. He says to us today, "As the Father sent Me, even so I send you. You are the light of the world. You are My voice in a changing world. Let us ask God to be with us in this awesome work which He is opening for us. Father Jerry

The exterior of the building looks great, Pete. Thank you! Your contributions to Mochas for Missions, \$701, has been sent to C.O.M.E. Thanks to Melita Green for chairing the fund drive and thanks to all who contributed. We met and exceeded our goal. With those obligations met, the Dedicated Account now has a balance of \$7,596. Some of those funds are earmarked for specific items, while others are unrestricted donations.

We enter the month of August with \$9,177 in the Operations Fund. This is two thousand dollars less than we entered July. 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CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

A Christian steward is a person who responsibly manages his/her time, talents, possessions and self. The faithful and wise steward is the one who knows that the Master has set him in charge of His household and gives him his portion of food at the proper time (Luke 12:42). Stewardship embraces every area of life. It calls on us to realize that we are not owners of our time and talents. We are stewards, called to manage these gifts for a brief time, always responsible to the God Who entrusts them to us. It is inappropriate for God's Church to beg for offerings of time, talent, or treasury. Each of us should give because we need to give. We need to express to God our gratitude for His countless blessings to us. We give because we need to acknowledge practically in our lives with such concrete things as our time, talents and possessions that God does indeed come first; that He deserves the first and the best portion of all that I am and possess.

Offerings of Time

The Greek word for time is "kairo." Its usage in the Septuagint suggests a "decisive point of time". As for the righteous of the Old Testament, they were blessed to wisely discern that all points of time are given by God. In its New Testament usage, "kairo" is given intensity by Jesus and the moral teachings of Paul. "Decisive points in time" are ever reoccurring in the Christian life and must be recognized and actualized. Our time should be wisely spent. We should find ourselves in Divine Services throughout the week (on time!) offering our supplications and our thanksgiving. We should find opportunities to study and grow in our faith. We should fellowship in filial love. We should minister to those in need. To neglect or deny the significance of our time in relation to our salvation is ultimately remaining blind to God's will.

Offerings of Talent

Talent is best understood as gifts of the Holy Spirit, "charismata." Some of these gifts are spiritual manifestations, bestowed through the anointing with Holy Chrism, while others are gifts that are bestowed through the laying on of hands in the Rite of Ordination. It is this continuous presence of the Spirit that makes possible the constant, progressive, personal growth of the Christian into the image and likeness of God. In God's wisdom, we were all created to be different in our abilities and talents. The purpose of our unique, personal gifts, as attested by Scripture, is for the benefit of all. In this way the Church is built up as the Body of Christ of which we are all members. As for each member, each is equally as important as the next for the overall life and working of the body. The challenge is to not only discern God-given gifts, but also to employ them to His Glory.

Offerings of Treasure

In making our financial gifts to the Church, we are not paying for something. Just like our homes, we don't pay for the meals we eat or the rooms in which we sleep; we don't pay wages to anyone for services. We simply provide all the things necessary for our home to function efficiently and respond to the physical needs of the entire family. The same is true with the Church. We provide all the things necessary for the Church to function efficiently, to respond to the spiritual needs of all the members of the Body of Christ. Our hope each and every year is to meet our operating budget through our financial gifts. In order to achieve this goal, we ask our families to follow the Biblical directive of tithing (10% of one's treasurers). It's important though not to forget that Jesus was not interested in 5%, 7% or even a tithe; He was interested in 100% of the person.

- **Dormition Fast:** The fourth major Fast period of the Church year begins on Monday, August 1st. Four Ways Fasting Helps You Love God and Neighbor

We're just a few days away from the start of the Dormition Fast, two weeks of preparation before we celebrate the falling asleep of the Theotokos.

As with any fast, this period is an incredible opportunity that can help us in at least four ways:

- 1. Fasting helps us be mindful of what we say. It's about more than what goes into our mouths, it's also about what comes out of them.
- 2. Fasting helps us develop discipline. Choosing to avoid certain foods helps strengthen us to avoid other temptations and instead choose Christ.
- 3. Fasting helps us develop gratitude. When our stomachs grumble with hunger, it's a reminder of the many blessings we may take for granted.
- 4. Fasting puts us in a position to better serve our neighbors. The Church has always taught that any money we save by eating simple foods should be given to those who are hungry.

And that's perhaps the most important point to remember. Don't simply spend the first two weeks of August worried about what you can't eat: use those weeks to fast, of course, but also to pray, to attend services, to live with kindness and joy.

Use those two weeks to get better at loving God and neighbor with all your heart!
