

Enrollment FAQs

What is the schedule at the Learning Center?

For the 2023 – 2024 Academic Year, our full-day program will meet on Tuesdays & Thursdays from 8:45am - 1:45pm. We will partly follow Eugene 4J's school schedule, modifying it to fit the Orthodox liturgical calendar. Specifics will come out in the Family Handbook. What will tuition and fees be? Do you have any financial assistance?

For the 2023 – 2024 Academic Year, tuition for our full-day program is \$235/month per child, paid directly to your child's tutor. A scholarship program is available through St. George Greek Orthodox Church, and applications can be requested at: <u>hsclc@stgeorgeor.org</u>. We collect a \$60/registration deposit per child once admitted.

What curriculum will be used?

Our core curriculum is A Gentle Feast, a Charlotte Mason program for all ages which integrates the subjects of history, literature, science, art, and geography through different historical periods. We supplement this program as needed with other literature-based curricula. Our Pre-K & Kindergarten groups may also include Montessori-inspired methods and materials.

Our Middle School program incorporates elements of classical logic and rhetoric, emphasizes the development of the students' abilities to think and communicate critically, clearly, and effectively, and above all, encourages the growth of wisdom, a lifelong love of learning, and thoughtful engagement with the world.

What homeschool work will I be doing with my child at home?

This depends on the age of your child and what is communicated between you and your child's tutor. Whatever it may be, it will coincide with the schoolwork your child is doing while at the Learning Center, so their learning will come together to create a rich educational experience for your child and family.

Does my child need to be an Orthodox Christian to participate?

Though not required to be Orthodox Christians, the parents and/or guardians of students should have a clear understanding that this is an Orthodox Christian learning environment. As part of their time together, children will be exposed to the teachings of the Orthodox Christian Faith in various and frequent ways within the program. In all things, this will be done in a loving and respectful manner.
