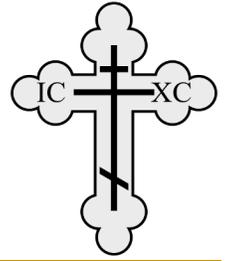

Dear Ones,

A blessed Dormition Fast to all!

“Who’s side are you on?”

In the 16th Chapter of St Matthew’s Gospel, we read about an intense exchange between Christ and Peter. Jesus begins to tell His disciples about the events of His Passion that are about to unfold, and Peter rebukes Him saying in essence, “God forbid it!”. Christ turns to Peter and says, “Get behind me, Satan! You are a hindrance to Me; for you are not on the side of God, but of men.” This passage was read a few days ago when we had a weekday liturgy. The Epistle reading that day, provided many reasons for why we should choose to be on the side of God. The reading is taken from St. Paul’s letter to the Romans, chapter 8, verses 28-39. There we read that “everything God works for good for those who love Him, and, if God is with us, who is against us, and, who shall separate us from the love of Christ...shall tribulation or distress, or persecution, or famine, or peril, or sword, or COVID-19... For I am sure that none of these will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord!” All this sounds good to me, but are you hearing it?

We are now five months into this pandemic. What we thought was just a “blizzard”, has extended to a winter, and now is extending into a “mini ice age”. We are not getting back to normal anytime soon. The year 1816 is known as “The Year Without a Summer,”. According to Wikipedia entry, the eruption of Mount Tambora in what is now Indonesia led to a worldwide ash plume that reduced solar radiation, causing widespread crop failures and unprecedentedly cold temperatures, with frosts recorded across Europe and North America even in the summer months. The metaphor is obvious. Just as winter is more chronic and long-lasting than a blizzard, and requires different sorts of adaptation, which are in many ways more far-reaching than merely hunkering down, so to a “mini ice age” will also require different sorts of adaptation. The adaptation we’ve made so far have helped us make the best out of this “winter of discontent”, yet I don’t think we’ve been all that successful. These have been months of testing, testing of our faith, testing of our obedience, and we have had to make hard choices. Have we made choices to be on the side of God or the side of men? We have made the church a safe place to come for communal worship and reconnecting with one another, and yet; most have chosen to stay away. People continue to shop at Costco and Safeway, for the foods that perish; yet are hesitant to return to in-person worship and the essential reception of the “Imperishable Food”. We’ve convinced ourselves that watching the services at home via live-stream is as good as being there, and yet when additional services are offered and tailored to people of high-risk, we don’t take advantage of it. We are created for relationship, and interdependence, yet have not found ways to gather other than to protest and riot. Choices matter.

In one sense I am thankful to God for this pandemic, because worse things are to come for all of us. These worse things will further test us, test our faith, and test our obedience. These are, and will be, months and years of testing for us. Will we choose fear or faith? Will we chose to be on the side of God or on the side of men?

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There is no quick fix available to us in this time. Different sorts of adaptation are needed. Each of us needs to adapt, and our parish needs to adapt. Individually we can adapt by increasing our commitment to our personal prayer rule, fasting rule, reading of Scripture, Confession, and praying the services at home. Since we now can have up to 100 people inside and 250 people outside for a service, we will be offering more services, including outdoor services. We can and will do more to connect with one another and create safe ways to fellowship. We can and will offer more opportunities for listening and learning.

I pray that this is a time of discernment for you personally. God is in this time as He is in all times, and His will is perfect. These times are for our good, for our salvation, and God is in control. If God is with us, who can be against us? Please don't let this pandemic, or the civil unrest, or the economic downturn, keep you from His love. Take a side Dear Ones, and choose to side with God.

What's New!

- **First Saturday Breakfast:** As of the printing of this edition of the AGAPE there was no news regarding the resuming of the First Saturday Breakfast.
- **Live-streaming:** Live-streaming of the Divine Services will continue. We invite you to tune in to our YouTube Channel (Saint George GOC), and pray the services with us. You can access the link by visiting our website www.stgeorgeor.org.
- **Dormition Fast:** The Dormition Fast begins on Saturday, August 1st and continues through Friday, August 14th. This is a strict-fast that helps us to reflect upon the life and death of our Most Holy Lady, the Theotokos and Ever-Virgin Mary. Paraklesis services are offered during this Fast, and it is a good idea to come for Confession. May we have her prayers and her protection!
- **Additional Services:** In addition to Saturday Great Vespers and Sunday Orthros & Liturgy, we will be offering additional services in the month of August. These include: Paraklesis on Monday, August 3rd at 5:30 pm, Friday, August 7th at 6 pm, and Monday, August 10th at 6 pm. For the Feast of Transfiguration there will be Great Vespers on Wednesday, August the at 6 pm and Orthros & Liturgy on Thursday, August 6th, beginning at 9 am. Weekday Orthros & Liturgies will be offered on Wednesday, August 12th (MVPs only), August 19th, and August 26th. For the Feast of the Dormition of the Theotokos there will be Great Vespers on Friday, August 14th at 6 pm, and Orthros & Liturgy on Saturday, August 15th, beginning at 9 am.
- **Baptized in Christ:** On Sunday, July 26th, at Holy Resurrection in Salem, we were blessed to receive eight new souls into the Church. We warmly welcome and embrace; Joel (Matthew) & Krystal (Sophia) Parks along with their three sons, Moses, Jude, and Ezra (Savva); Stacey (Anastasia) Porter; Jacob Armas; and Josh (Anthony) Anderson.
