Dear Ones,

A blessed new month to all!

In the concluding chapter of the Epistle to the Romans, St. Paul extends greetings to his co-workers in the Vineyard of the Lord. He continues, "Greetings also to the church that meets in their house (kat'oikon ekklesia)" (Romans 16:5). The "Church in the Home (kat' oikon ekkesia) is the first church in which our children learn about Christ, faith and liturgical life. It is here where the theology of the Church comes alive. Today however, the "kat' oikon ekklesia", quite often is no longer the strongest link in the Body of Christ. The good news is that this is true more out of ignorance and lack of knowledge rather than rejection and disapproval. Therefore it is with great expectation and joy that I share with you that we putting together a study of the book, "Making God Real in the Orthodox Christian Home".

This study is open to all members of our parish, including children. Ideally, this would be something the whole family participates in together. Using the Zoom platform, we will gather weekly to go through the book together and touch on topics dealing with Holy Communion, fasting, blessings, prayers, icons, family liturgical practices and church practices, just to name a few. The beauty of this book is that the concepts are theologically sound and dealt with in a simple down-to-earth language. The book also provides us with some things to think about and do.

The Orthodox Church has always emphasized the home as the center of worship and religious education. The icon corner with its votive light are to be a constant reminder of the "church in the home". The Church can do nothing without the home. The home is the most influential school in the world, greater than Harvard or Yale. The question is not, "Is there a school under your roof" but, "How good is the school under your roof? What are you teaching? What are you not teaching?"

If you think that all of this talk about the home is a terrifying amount of responsibility on the home, you are right. But listen to what Scripture says about the home: "Hear, O Israel, the Lord your God is one Lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might. And these words which I command you this day shall be upon your heart; and you shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house... (Duet. 6:3-7). If our children do not learn to know and love God in the home, they will be totally unprepared to go out into the world. If the one hour a week they spend in Church School is to be effective, it must be supplemented in the home, by informed, dedicated and faithful parents.

The Orthodox Church has also always emphasized "Koinonia", fellowship or community. Participating in this book study is a great way of developing the practice of weekly family home gatherings. Setting aside one specific evening each week as "Family Night" is a very effective way of strengthening the family bond and creating intimate space for each other. A special family time together each week will help revive the "church in the home" and be a continuous blessing to your children. I hope you will join us and participate together with your family. May it be blessed! *Father Jerry*

Greetings from the Bookstore! February Highlights

This month, the Bookstore will highlight books for children:

- The Lives of Saints: Friends of Christ (January and February): Friends of Christ is a new, twelvevolume series of books for young people. Each beautifully illustrated volume contains the lives of five Saints, which take children on a journey where the real events of history inspire them to love the Lord and His wondrous deeds in the lives of the Friends of Christ. Every day – and for everlasting ages – our Church celebrates! It honors the memory of all those who honored our Lord and His Church with their lives – the saints. They are men, women, and even young children. These books are dedicated to the friends of Christ, the Saints. The January volume contains the lives of St. Basil the Great, St. George the Neo-Martyr of Ioannina, St. Mark of Ephesus, the Venerable Ascetic Xenia, and the Venerable Ascetics Xenofon, his wife Maria, and their two children Arkadios and John. The February volume contains the lives St. Nikiphoros, St. Haralambos the Hieromartyr, St. Theodora the Empress, the Venerable ascetic Philotheir the Athenian, and the Great Martyr Photini the Samaritan woman. Each volume also contains a morning prayer to one's patron saint, glossary of words within the stories, as well as a large decal of the Saints of that month.
- **Everything Teaches Us about God:** The world is like a giant puzzle God made that teaches us about Himself. Every piece earth, sea and sky, plants, animals, and people reveals something about who He is and why we're here. Everything Tells Us about God will help children recognize the beautiful and sometimes mysterious pieces of this puzzle for themselves.
- The Creation of the World. God was from the beginning. There was nothing else, only God. In His mind, God planned for the world. It was a beautiful plan, full of brightness and lovely colors. The world was like a giant puzzle God made to tell us about Himself The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Every piece whispers one of his secrets all we need to do is listen.
- **My Prayer Book:** Prayer is essential. It is the very breath of the human soul. Through the helpful explanations and vivid illustrations of this book, one can learn, together with our children, what every Orthodox Christian needs to know in order to love this life breath of the soul. Along with the many prayers, there are explanations for each to help one understand the prayers, their meaning, and when they can be used.

Prison Ministry Update

Due to the continued restrictions because of Covid, the Orthodox Bible Study continues to be on hold. We are thankful that the chaplains are helping us send some kind of reflective readings to our group one time a month, and we are almost done reading the first chapter in St. Paisios of Mt Athos book: Spiritual Struggle. This section deals with thoughts of a cunning man and a spiritual man, plus how thoughts reveal our spiritual state. We hope these readings are helpful during this time of uncertainty. Most of the Adults in Custody (AIC's as the State of Oregon calls those incarcerated) belong to the 1b group to receive vaccinations. They remain, however, at greater risk than most due to the inability to socially distance, and in some cases living in dorm rooms with 60-100 people. The Oregon State Penitentiary is presently listed at a Tier 4 level meaning they are under quarantine for 14 days. There are 56 active cases at present. Please continue to keep these men, and all those incarcerated in your prayers. I would encourage you to check out The Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry and their blog: Behind the Bars.
