

Prayer Chain/Tree and Daily Prayers:

Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!

In addition to the Saturday evening Prayer Circle, we are adding a couple other ways we can support our parish and one another through prayer.

The first is through a Prayer Chain or Prayer Tree. This is basically a way we can more efficiently help pray for one another in times of immediate need. How does it work? It is pretty simple once all the initial pieces are in place. If someone, for example, has an upcoming surgery or job interview, or has a family member that was in a car accident or is struggling with some great need that they would like prayer for, then they call, text or email the "Lead" person or Fr. Jerry, and this person will start the "chain reaction" of getting these requests to everyone who wants to be involved praying for these needs. We have a volunteer to be this Lead: Noël Elizabeth Sumstine. Upon receiving the initial requests, she will set off the chain and send out an email to those who would like to be alerted of these requests this way. She will also call Bonnie Sollars, who will then either text or call people who have chosen to be alerted in this fashion. If there are too many for Bonnie to call, we will ask for additional volunteers. We are hoping that this will allow us to better support one another prayerfully in our immediate times of need.

Secondly, for those interested, we have made a created a "prayer for the day" that people can tack onto their daily prayers where we will be praying specifically for our parish members and/or ministries. There will be handouts provided with each day's prayer, and if there are specific people involved beyond the obvious, their names will also be included with the specific prayer provided. On Mondays, the prayer is for the Clergy, where we can specifically pray for Fr. Jerry, and other clergy members serving the church. Tuesdays we will remember the children in the parish, Wednesday is for our prison ministry, Thursday is for those sick, Friday for members of the parish and our families or whomever we want to remember, and Saturdays are for the reposed.

We recognize not everyone may want to participate, but if you are interested in being prayed for - especially on Fridays, or you have someone whom you would like remembered either for Thursday's prayers for the sick or Saturday's prayers for the reposed, please let Joanna Jaquette know, or write this down clearly on the sheets that will provided after lunch on Sunday. These names (Please provide baptismal names- just first names are sufficient) will then be put onto lists that people can pick up with the specific prayers.

Metropolitan Athanasios of Cyprus is fond of saying that prayer brings all good things to the soul. Please consider joining us in this important ministry!

Parish Council

Father has challenged parish council members to attend one more activity per week at the church and to bring a friend – you! In that same vein, Stella Kallianis will be encouraging you to bring Orthodoxy into your home through the books available to you in the bookstore.

Steve Tussing is attempting to bring Orthodox students from both Oregon State and the University of Oregon closer to their faith by sharing time together while they are away from home – a critical juncture in their spiritual lives.

The council approved the purchase of new curtains for the Deacon's doors and Royal Doors. It also approved the professional painting of the doors on the west side of the building and the addition of another handicapped parking space.

The parish has added an Instagram page, and Steve continues to work on upgrading our church computer in a cost-effective way.

The parish has donated 159 pounds of food to Food for Lane County thus far in 2019.

Philia suggested profits from the Greek dinner go to the various ministries of the parish – excluding Philia; profits from the GyroFest go to Philia; and profits from the bake sale and Kafenion go to the building fund.

The suggestion was brought forth as a motion and passed unanimously.

For safety reasons, the council is asking children under ten not be left unsupervised in the playroom. Please bring them to the Nave to participate in the services.

At the very least, bring them to the Narthex where there are speakers and glass through which they can observe the services.

OUR STEWARDSHIP OFFERING

Our giving to the Church should be obvious, for everything we have comes from the Lord. God is the Creator and Sustainer of all things. Nothing exists or comes into our possession apart from God. Our offerings should serve as a symbol of our thanksgiving to God. When we forget this important truth, we are also likely to forget about God. The result will be a truly false sense of self-reliance. When Christ came in the fullness of time, He did not abolish the Law and Prophets; He fulfilled them (Mt.5:17). He not only fulfilled the Old Covenant, but He established a New Covenant. In the Old Testament, we know that the commandment was to tithe. In the New Testament, Jesus does not directly address tithing. Instead, he points to a widow who is seen giving two copper coins in the Temple treasury. Jesus uses this widow as an example of giving to His disciples. She didn't just give ten percent; she gave everything she had! "And He called His disciples to Him, and said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For they all contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, her whole living.'" (Mk.12:43-44).

This is the spirit of sacrificial giving that our Lord holds up as the most perfect way to give. Of course, not everyone is able to give away everything when they walk into church. We have responsibilities that require us to manage our money and be wise to meet the needs of our families. There is, however, an important principle derived from the example of the widow. Jesus is trying to illustrate for us a spirit of giving which teaches us to depend on Him; to remember He is the Giver of all good things; to be free from greed; and to become grateful and cheerful givers of our first and our best.

Summer is on its way, and the days will be warmer, longer, and hopefully, less hectic. Here are some book highlights for your summer reading. I hope you can enjoy them.

The Gurus, the Young Man, and Elder Paisios (Dionysios Farasiotis). Popular in Greece since its first publication in 2001, this book is a narrative of both outward adventures and inner struggles. What stands out most in this book is the radiant image of Elder Paisios, possessed of divine gifts, laboring in prayer for his fellow man, and overflowing with unconditional love for his fellow man. Through this, one sees the uncreated Source of the elder's love and the author's spiritual transformation.

An Inner Step Toward God; Writing and Teachings on Prayer by Father Alexander Men. Available for the first time in English, this collection of Father Alexander Men's prayers, teachings, and writing on prayer center on the theme of taking "an inner step of faith" toward God. Many topics are covered including prayer as a loving response to God, the body and prayer, prayer as a sacramental encounter, meditation in prayer, and exercises that may enhance prayer.

Special Agents of Christ. A Prayer Book for Young Orthodox Saints. This prayer book was written by the author of the popular teen prayer book *Hear Me* especially for young teens. *Special Agents of Christ* serves as a "training manual" to prepare children for serving in Christ in the real world, with sections for daily prayers, prayers for life's challenges, preparations for confession, and much more.

And for your safe travels during the Summer, the Bookstore has travel and car icons, and prayer cards, books, and bracelets. Wherever your travels take you this summer, "do not forget prayer, it is the life of the soul."

Prison Ministry Update:

Christ is Risen!

For the past several years, Fr. Jerry, along with other volunteers, and myself, have been providing a Bible Study for a group of men at Oregon State Penitentiary. We are reading through the gospels using the different commentaries by St. Theophylact, discussing questions as we go along. During Lent this year we covered several sections of Fr. Alexander Schmemmann's book, Great Lent. As most of these men have limited experience with Orthodoxy, they enjoyed learning more about the themes of Great Lent, and how it helps prepare us for the celebration of Christ's resurrection. They all received their Pascha cards, and thank everyone for remembering them. Hopefully we can do this at each major holiday.

One of the biggest challenges in being in prison is being "forgotten" by those on the "outside". Letters and cards are a great way to help those encourage those who are incarcerated, and has been shown to reduce recidivism or repeat incarceration. The Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry (OCPM) has a helpful set of guidelines for becoming penpals and helping people, as Hebrews 13:3 says, "Remember those in prison..." If you would like to write to one of these men, each of them would appreciate it. Several expressed interest in having a pen-pal, and most will write back as they are able. It is not always easy to afford paper, envelopes and stamps, but they appreciate hearing from people regardless.

- Ask a coworker to coffee
- Invite a coworker to your house
- Put people on your prayer list
- Share a church post on Facebook
 - Write an old friend
 - Text an old friend
- Buy a friend flowers, attach an icon to it
 - Buy an icon for a friend
- Go to a monastery, invite a friend
- Ask a neighbor to come over for dinner
 - Write out your testimony
- Buy gift cards for local food places like Subway, McDonald's and hand them to people in need.
 - Wear an Orthodox Cross and be ready to explain what it is.
 - Add a prayer for missions/evangelism to your daily prayer routine.
 - Grab a bunch of church 'business' cards and commit to always having one on hand.
- Write a short sentence answering the question, 'Why do you go to Church'. Practice it, so you can speak with boldness when asked that question.
 - Practice smiling (with your eyes as well as your mouth) at people who look very different than you!
 - Do the "fresh eyes" experiment of seeing the parish as though you're arriving for the first time
 - Watch a video--you can suggest a specific one--about Orthodoxy
- Review the information that your parish website offers to guests. Note all the questions or thoughts that you have as you do these things and discuss them with your priest or others!
