#### "Peace be to all"

#### Christ is risen! Truly He is risen!

For my message this month, I want to share some excerpts from Dn. Steve's homily which he gave on Thomas Sunday.

What is this peace that Christ gives to His apostles and to us after His resurrection? St. Maximos the Confessor explains it so simply and beautifully "Peace is truly the complete and undisturbed possession of what is desired. Christ's peace has the ability to finally satisfy all of our deepest desires in a complete and unshakable way. This definition is expanded if we look to both the Greek and Hebrew words for peace. εἰρήνη in Greek, has the root word εἴρω which means to join; and thus when we acquire Christ's peace, we are joined to Him. Shalom in Hebrew expresses the idea of wholeness, completeness, and tranquility in the soul that is unaffected by outward circumstances or pressures. This is why the beatitudes say 'blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called sons of God' (Matthew 5:9). When we acquire true peace we are jointed to Christ, are fulfilled by His presence and are complete; we truly become children of God; we have reached the end state that we all desire. This is why Christ offers His peace to the disciples when He first comes to them and to Thomas; when Christ offers His peace, He is offering Himself to us. The peace of Christ is communion with Him. When we focus our desire towards Him everything else fades away. When we accept His sovereignty over all things, both in heaven and earth, everything falls in its proper place. When we realize our weaknesses and sinfulness simultaneously with His forgiveness and healing we are transformed. And when we experience His love and we respond in love we experience heaven. This is a peace that goes beyond emotional feelings and intellectual certitudes since it surpasses all that this world can offer. It is only Christ's peace that can guard our hearts and minds against every affliction so that we can finally have eternal contentment, relaxation, and be without stress. This peace is the actualization of God's grace within our lives which is why St. Seraphim of Sarov says, 'Acquire the Spirit of peace, and thousands around you will be saved.' It is this peace that turns people into saints, and how the good news of resurrection shines in a dark world. My dear brothers and sisters, it is in this time of pandemic that the peace we receive from our Lord is continually being attacked and we must stay focused on the reality of the resurrection to maintain it. Like Thomas, we can begin to doubt our Lord and His resurrection. We lose the peace He offers to us because we stop de-

siring our Savior and start desiring to only be freed from the negative symptoms we are experiencing. We bind our sight to only earthly things rather than heavenly and so we cannot see the transcend peace our Savior extends to us and we only seek temporary peace from our immediate suffering.

This is why we need to spend time in prayer to connect with our resurrected Lord and so we don't fall into continual fear and worry. This is how we resist distractions that misguide our desires away from communion with the living God. May the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus, amidst this pandemic. Father Jerry

#### Bookstore Highlights: Church in the Home.

I hope you all had a blessed Pascha. It is sad and difficult to not be able to worship in our Church among our family and friends. Nonetheless, we are fortunate and blessed to be able to participate in services at home by live stream. We can burn incense at home, pray at our altar corner, read our prayer books, and sing the hymns. So, for the time being, we will adjust however long the duration. The Bookstore highlight this month will focus on the children. There is no Church school for them, and the inevitable likelihood is that classes will not resume for the remainder of this school year. The younger children rely on us, as adults, to help guide and nurture them in their Orthodox Christian faith. Even though families can watch the live stream services together, the children might be observers of these services; whereas we already know the meaning and significance of the various stages of the service. We can turn to our faith for strength and peace during life challenges. So, with the children in mind, the highlights this month are:

I recently was reminded about being mindful in how I in participate in services (especially now). I have my copy of the Divine Liturgy, which was passed down to me from my mother. I usually turn right to the beginning of the Divine Liturgy. This past Sunday, however, I read through the introduction, the Preface and the Prologue. This particular edition (Fourth Edition 2009) was published for Archbishop Iakovos on his 30th anniversary as Archbishop of North and South America. In his Prologue he wrote: "..... It is to all of you, therefore, that I address these words in order that I might ask you to study the Divine Liturgy often, to celebrate it each time as though it were your first time and, above all, to live it. Try very hard not to allow the Divine Liturgy to become routine, something without feeling or meaning, for it is not a simple rite or ritual, but something that must become part of your personal life, so that each time you celebrate it you will feel spiritually rewarded and renewed. Celebrate the Divine Liturgy, therefore, with a praying congregation which hopes to make the Liturgy a personal experience, since it has the power to transport us to heaven. "I miss tending to the Bookstore, and I miss all if you. And I look forward to when we can once again be together to worship in Church. If there is anything the Bookstore can provide, I would be happy to schedule times for you. I wish you many blessings, much peace, and well being.

One thing we all can still do to spread the gospel, is to support the Missions Possible campaign of the Metropolis. The Missions and Evangelism ministry of our metropolis has been instrumental in helping us here locally at St. George in many ways. One visible way was helping us design the beautiful blue welcome packets we give to visitors and our new matching sign. Two years ago, Thomaida gave a mini retreat to inspire us in our personal evangelistic efforts. This ministry also helps the 6 mission churches in our metropolis in many ways. Over the years, the funds have supported these missions to send delegates to the Clergy Laity Conference. It has also covered traveling expenses for visiting priests, given money to start bookstores and allowed staff to talk to seminarians about missions.
