Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!

Please enjoy this beautiful reflection by St. Gregory the Theologian...Third Theological Oration

By what authority are you doing these things?

He was baptized a man-but He remitted sins as God, not because He needed purificatory rites Himself, but that He might sanctify the element of water. He was tempted as a man, but He conquered as God; indeed He bids us be of good cheer, for He has overcome the world.

He hungered, but He fed thousands; indeed He is the bread that gives life, and that is of heaven. He thirsted, but He cried, "If any man thirsts, let him come to Me and drink; indeed, He promised that fountains should flow from those who believe.

He was wearied, but He is the rest to those who are weary and heavy-laden. He was heavy with sleep, but He walked lightly over the sea.

He rebuked the winds, He made Peter light as he began to sink. He pays tribute, but it is out of a fish; indeed, He is the king of those who demanded it.

He weeps, but He causes tears to cease. He asks where Lazarus is laid, for He was man; but He raises Lazarus, for He was God.

He is sold, and very cheap, for it is only for thirty pieces of silver; but He redeems the world, and that at a great price, for the price was His own blood.

As a sheep He is led to the slaughter, but He is the shepherd of Israel, and now the whole world also. As a lamb He is silent, yet He is the Word, and is proclaimed by the voice of one crying in the wilderness.

He is bruised and wounded, but He heals every disease and every infirmity.

He is lifted up and nailed to the tree, but by the tree of life He restores us; indeed He saves even the robber crucified with Him, indeed He wrapped the visible world in darkness.

He is given vinegar to drink mingled with gall. Who? He who turned water into wine, who is the destroyer of the bitter taste, who is sweetness and altogether desired.

He lays down His life, but He has power to take it again...He dies, but He gives life, and by His death destroys death. He is buried but he rises again; He goes down into hell, but He brings up the souls.

Christ is risen! Truly He is risen!

Greetings from the Bookstore! Christos Anesti! Alithos Anesti!

I hope all have had a blessed and fulfilling Lenten Season and Pascha. Still to come, however, are the Feasts of the Ascension of our Lord and Pentecost.

The Bookstore highlights this month will include an excerpt from Vassilios Papavassiliou's Meditations for the 12 Great Feasts, Becoming Fully Human in Christ.

Chapter 9: Children of God, the Ascension of our Lord: "When you came down from heaven to things on earth, and as God raised up with you Adam's nature which lay below in the prison of Hades, You brought it to heaven by Your Ascension, O Christ, and made it sit with You on Your Father's throne, for You are merciful and love mankind. (Matins of the Ascension, Kathisma)

Someone once asked me why the Feast of the Ascension is not a fast day. Perplexed, I inquired why he thought such a feast should be a fast day. He replied, "Because the Lord left humanity on this day, so surely it is a day of sorrow." This misses the point of the significance of the Ascension, which is not about Christ leaving the world, but rather about Him raising us up to the heavenly Father. In ascending to God, our Lord took with Him our human nature, which He assumed for our salvation. Because He shares in our humanity, we share in his divinity; He is the first to ascend to God the Father in the flesh, thus paving the way for all of us: "I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also." (John 14:2-3)

If the purpose of the Incarnation is for Christ to restore us to the image and likeness of God, then this work is completed in the Ascension. As St. Paul writes: "He who descended is also the One who ascended far above all the heavens, that He might fill all things." (Eph. 4:9-10)

In the Ascension the divine destination of humanity is made clear. Our Lord plans not only to restore us to our former dignity and to the earthly paradise that was lost, but to raise us up to heaven: He grants us something even greater than what we had before the Fall. To be truly human is to be a child of God. Therein lies the significance of the work Christ came to do. Having become our brother, the Son of God made us children of his Father: "I am ascending to My Father and your Father, and to My God and your God." (John 20:17)

Unlike other animals, human beings have a divine vocation. We cannot be fully human if we do not recognize and respond to that vocation. Since we know that our true home and destination is the throne of God, let our minds and hopes be fixed not on the earth, but on heaven above: "Abandoning on earth the things of the earth, leaving to the dust the things of the dust, let us now come to our senses and lift up our eyes and minds. O mortals, let our sight and all our senses fly to the gates of heaven. (Matins of the Ascension, Ikos)"

In addition, the Bookstore highlights Thinking Orthodox, Understanding and Acquiring the Orthodox Christian Mind, by Eugenia Scarvelis Constantinou, Ph.D., which comes highly recommended by several parishioners. This clear, convincing, practical, well-crafted, and highly recommended book argues that the heritage of the Orthodox faith includes not only a distinct theology, but also a distinctive pattern of thinking theologically. It is not the task of theology to refine, clarify, and apply an ever-greater precision to the content of the Faith. As a component of the life of Christ, rather, Orthodox thinking strives to acquire and maintain a disciplined, humble, and devout mind. Orthodox Christianity is based on preserving the mind of the early Church, its phronema. Dr. Constantinou explains the Orthodox phronema, how it can be acquired and how that phronema is expressed in true Orthodox spirituality.

I welcome and appreciate your suggestions and recommendations and wish you many blessings and much peace.
