Dear Ones, "Now Is the Time"

As the temperatures cool into autumn, we find that while we've been waiting for things to get back to "normal," we'll now settle for whatever the "new normal" establishes itself as, just so we can get on with our lives. In many ways, our lives are on hold until the world settles into some kind of normal. As unusual as the situation is, we've been in this way of thinking before. Many times in our lives we may have thought, "If only such-and-such would happen, then things would be great!" And so forth. We likely have come to some realization in the present condition that in order for us to move forward with our lives, particularly on what we may consider essential activities, that we have had to adapt and accommodate new ways of doing things so that we can go about those essential pursuits. We have come to recognize that some aspects of our lives which we may have thought of previously as essential are now moved to the optional-until-life-is-normal-again list. For some, this list of optional activities includes life in the Church.

Saint Paul and the early Church did not exist at a time of ideal stability to create optimal conditions for the message of Christ to spread. Rather, the first century was a time of upheaval, of what was their "normal," marked by territorial occupation by an empire hostile to them, to their culture, and to their religion — especially as it would come to be realized, this new religion of Christianity, which would eventuate unprecedented attempts by the empire to exterminate it. We know from the letters of St. Paul , that he and the other apostles had to endure afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, tumults, labors, watching, and hunger. That's a long list, and far more than what we of our modern lives centered on technology, convenience, and hand sanitizer, could likely endure.

There were many reasons why Paul and the other apostles could have put their urgent mission of preaching the Gospel and planting Churches on hold to wait for a better time, since there were many forces working against them. They could have waited for the right moment, for a more acceptable time, to do their work, but they didn't wait. St. Paul and the others pressed forward with the mission God had given them. They showed themselves as servants of God by cultivating purity, knowledge, forbearance, kindness, genuine love, and truthful speech, by the Holy Spirit and with reliance on the power of God.

Clearly, St. Paul felt a sense of urgency and determination that didn't wait for what may seem like the acceptable time to eventuate. In fact, he said, "Now is the acceptable time. Now is the day of salvation." God has His timing. "Paul teaches us that God worked His salvation for all of humanity with perfect timing. Jesus came at the perfect time." Thus, God's timing is perfect, and the question is not, "When will the time be perfect for us?" but rather, "Will we participate in this perfect and acceptable timing of God's work in the world?" Behold, now is the acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation. May we accept the Lord's invitation that He may work His will in us. May we strive to manifest the evidence of the Holy Spirit working in us by attributes that reveal the fruits of the Spirit rather than of our passions. And thus may we endure, with God's help. Amen.

A Reflection on Christian Stewardship by Saint John Chrysostom

"Do I possess the house in which I live? No, it is only on loan to me from God while I remain in that place. Do I possess the clothes I wear? No, they are on loan to me until they wear out, or until I give them away to someone in greater need. Do I possess this body that you see before you? No, it was lent to me by God when I was born; and He will take it back when I die. Do I possess the mind that is composing the words that I write? No, that too was lent by God at my birth and will go when I die. So do I possess anything? Yes, I possess the virtues, which during my life have grown and flourished within my soul. Inasmuch as I have grown in faith, I possess faith. Inasmuch as I have grown in gentleness, I possess gentleness. These things are immortal; they are divine gifts, which God will not take away, because He wants heaven itself to be filled with virtue. And, of course, I possess my soul, in which these virtues have their roots."

Church School Report

"With discernment, parents should help their children, from a young age, to draw near to Christ and to experience, from that young age, the higher joys the spiritual ones. When they start going to school, they should teach them, little by little, to read spiritual books and help them live spiritually. Then they can become angels and their prayer will have greater boldness before God. Such children are a spiritual investment for the family. Specifically, the Lives of the Saints greatly assist children in the spiritual life. When I was little, I would take those little books with the Lives of the Saints that were available in those years, and I would go into the woods to study them and to pray. I was flying with joy. From the age of ten to sixteen, when the Greek-Italian War began, I lived a carefree spiritual life. Childhood joys are pure; they leave a lifelong imprint on a person, who will find himself very moved by (the memory of) them when he is older. If children live spiritually, they will live joyfully in this life and rejoice eternally in the presence of Christ in the afterlife."

What saves and makes for good children is . .

"What saves and makes for good children is the life of the parents in the home. The parents need to devote themselves to the love of God. They need to become saints in their relations to their children through their mildness, patience, and love. They need to make a new start every day, with a fresh outlook, renewed enthusiasm and love for their children. And the joy that will come to them, the holiness that will visit them, will shower grace on their children. Generally the parents are to blame for the bad behavior of the children. And their behavior is not improved by reprimands, disciplining, or strictness. If the parents do not pursue a life of holiness and if they don't engage in spiritual struggle, they make great mistakes and transmit the faults they have within them. If the parents do not live a holy life and do not display love towards each other, the devil torments the parents are what are required for the children. This provides a great sense of security and certainty." — St. Porphyrios
