Dear Ones,

#### A blessed new Church Year to all!

If a time-traveler from the Early Church secretly followed you from Monday till Saturday evening, would they be able to tell you're a Christian? The answer for many of us just isn't very clear... and that's no accident. Many Christians live lives indistinguishable from secularists. The reason? Well, quite simply, secularism is the default state of our culture. It's the water we swim in—the air we all breathe. Or, as author Craig Gay put it in his book, "The Way of the Modern World," the problem isn't atheism. In fact, a red-blooded atheist is hard to find. The problem, he said, is "practical atheism." It's not that people do not believe in God, it's that they live as if God is largely irrelevant. That's what secularism does to us. It doesn't disprove our faith, it dismisses it. It makes faith an issue of personal, private belief, disconnected from the outside world. Catholic philosopher Charles Taylor has written the monumental work on the subject called "A Secular Age." The marginalization of religious belief in our world, Taylor argues, has led to "disenchantment." While God's revelation in creation was obvious to prior generations, we completely miss the sacred things revealed in the way the world is made and ordered.

Scripture's metaphors make no sense in a disenchanted culture. As practical atheists, we are deaf to the heavens' loud proclamation of the glory of God. Stars and rainbows remind us more of human achievement and self-determination than they do of God's promises. Even breathtaking events like weddings, the birth of a child, or even death itself, fail to remind us of God's eternal attributes. In other words, we live in a world where the assumptions that govern how we think and what we do are almost always secular ones. Whatever people may say on surveys about their religious beliefs, the fact is that modern, Western life is overwhelmingly lived without even considering God.

Living as a six-day secularist, shaped by secular assumptions and rituals, has very serious and practical consequences. Good things result from our hard work and planning, we think, not from the gracious hands of our loving Father. Also, because God is not easily replaced as an organizing principle for life itself, many of us today find ourselves living lives of fragmentation—our thoughts, emotions, and desires constantly pulling us in opposite directions; the changing values all around us giving us worldview-whiplash. Still, worst of all, practical atheists are always subject to idolatry. As John Calvin said, humans are incurably religious creatures, and our secular age offers all kinds of God-replacements: sex, self, stuff, state, science. Ironically, a secular age is still filled with faith—just in all the wrong gods. These gods mark us in their images in profoundly dehumanizing ways.

The only way to be distinctly Christian in today's culture is to consciously and intentionally swim against the secular currents. First, we need to recognize them, as well as how they sweep us away.

Thank God this is not only possible; it's been done before. Christians throughout history have had to swim against cultural currents opposed to their beliefs. Many not only succeeded in keeping their faith but in transforming the surrounding culture. May it be true of us!

## Missions and Evangelism Ministry: Our Story

In the summer of 2011, we visited a "Glendi" Greek festival at St. John the Baptist GOC in Beaverton. We went for the food, but we found something much better! Here is a very short version of what happened next. My husband, 8th grade daughter and myself went inside for Greek coffee and dessert. While sitting there, I noticed some stories printed on a board, entitled "My Journey into Orthodoxy". I was intrigued—I thought people were born Greek Orthodox! Next we went on a church tour. I saw cookbooks for fasting, someone painting icons, and then I read some of the Divine Liturgy. I'm not sure what prayers I read, but I was struck with the beauty of them. Our tour guide said, "we trace our faith back to the apostles." I thought, "then you know what the Bible really means!"

You see, I had been a serious studier of the Bible for about 12 years, by then. I was coming to the conclusion, that the more I studied, the less I understood. This revelation felt like a breath of fresh air. I would be able to understand how to really live a Christian life! We next walked into the Nave and there I saw all the icons—"the great cloud of witnesses" from Hebrews. Wow!

Then our guide took us forward to the iconostasis and he proceeded to explain baptism and sang "whoever has been baptized in Christ, has put on Christ." He was in tears as he shared his faith with us. My daughter and I both felt so peaceful in that beautiful space.

Over the next few weeks, two different people I knew told me they were Orthodox and one gave me a stack of books to read. Thus began the journey! About 1 1/2 years later, the three of us were brought into the one Holy, Catholic and Apostolic church. All these years later, our journey still continues. Thank God. # What's New!

- **First Saturday Breakfast**: As of the printing of this edition of the AGAPE there was no news regarding the resuming of the First Saturday Breakfast.
- **Live-streaming:** Live-streaming of the Divine Services will continue. We invite you to tune in to our YouTube Channel (Saint George GOC), and pray the services with us. You can access the link by visiting our website www.stgeorgeor.org.
- Additional Services: In addition to Saturday Great Vespers and Sunday Orthros & Liturgy, we will be offering additional services in the month of September. These include: Orthros & Liturgy on Tuesday, September 1st, beginning at 9 am, for the Beginning of the New Church Year; Orthros & Liturgy on Tuesday, September 8th, beginning at 9 am, for the feast of the Nativity of the Theotokos; and Orthros & Liturgy on Wednesday, September 16th (MVP), 23rd and 30th, beginning at 9 am, for an additional opportunity for you to receive the Eucharist.
- **Baptized in Christ**: On Sunday, August 30th, the Hughes Family were received into the Church. Stephen's sponsor is Mark Jaquette, and he was baptized "Stephen" (Protomartyr); Alli's sponsor is Joanna Jaquette, and she took the name Theodora (St Theodora the Virgin Martyr); Sophia kept her name as did Elizabeth.
